German and Dutch User Workshop on the Survey of Health, Ageing and Retirement in Europe (SHARE)

We are happy to announce the Call for Papers for the joint German and Dutch SHARE User Workshop.

This workshop aims at students and researchers from Germany and the Netherlands interested in presenting own SHARE research, learning how to get more out of the SHARE data, and networking with other SHARE data users. The workshop will include two types of presentations:

1. **Scientific presentations:** Presentations on your scientific results based on SHARE data. Researchers are invited to submit short ongoing research on all topics. Submissions by colleagues at earlier stages of their scientific career are particularly welcome.
2. **Practical sessions:** Presentations on the use of SHARE data, such as the content and data structure of the newest data releases and possibilities for linkage with register data.

Submission of abstracts: We invite abstracts on all topics based on SHARE. All submissions should include about 300 words providing information about the research question, type of empirical analysis, and if possible, main results. Please send it to Sabine Friedel (friedel@mea.mpisoc.mpg.de).

Deadline for submissions of abstracts: March 8th, 2019.

All applicants will be notified about their acceptance by the end of March, 2019, latest. A detailed program will be made available as soon as possible.
